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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I would like to thank all community members for their flexibility and understanding regarding the occasional inconveniences that are occurring in preparation for the laying of the foundations of our new Stage One building at our Heatherton Road Campus.

In the coming week, a major disruption will occur on *Tuesday, 24th and Wednesday, 25th May*. On both these days our school buses will not be able to enter our Heatherton Road Campus. On both mornings our Middle School students will be let off the buses first. Each bus will then proceed to the Junior/Senior Campus and will let off students at the public bus stop at the front of the school. These processes will be closely supervised by staff members.

In the afternoon periods, our Middle School students will be picked up first. Buses will then proceed to the public bus stop at the front of our Heatherton Road Campus where Junior and Senior students will board their particular bus for the journey home.

All parent drop offs and pick ups, in the morning and afternoon, should be done so at our rear gate at McNab Court that runs off Gladstone Road.

All students, who walk to school, are able to access our Heatherton Road Campus via our temporary pedestrian path at the front of the school.

On Saturday, 14th May the Glenhuntly Athletic Club celebrated its 100th birthday with a dinner at The Grand on Princes in Mulgrave.


Some of the highlights from the evening were the launch of two books celebrating the club's history and a panel discussion with some of Glenhuntly and Australia's most decorated athletes.




Diane D has been nominated by Mr Van Twest for her outstanding work at the Middle School Blackwood Camp. Diane went above and beyond to support both staff and students.

ART NEWS—SCARECROW PROJECT AT GOVERNMENT HOUSE

On Wednesday, 11th May, 28 students from MSE, MSF, MSG, MSH, MSJ, MSK & MSL placed a happy scarecrow in the Peace and Prosperity Garden at Government House. They met the Governor of Victoria, Her Excellency the Honourable Linda Dessau AC, and her husband, Mr Anthony Howard AM QC. *Peace and Prosperity* is Victoria's state motto.

For several weeks, students from JSI, JSG, Ally from SSM, Cain from SSH, and Middle School students from MSA to MSL have been making a scarecrow. Decorating an art smock which became our scarecrows jacket, students used a wide range of techniques including: hand sewing, felting, embroidering, drawing, screen printing, spray painting, hand-painting and ironing-on-patches. Jade, A Kee Ya, Maya, and Sebastien spoke to the Governor and showed her what they had personally made, sewn or embroidered. The Honourable Linda Dessau AC is the 29th Governor of Victoria and the first female in the role. Her excellency was very impressed and delighted at Emerson School students colourful and elaborate work. The Governor symbolically added a special scarf with Victoria's floral emblem -Pink Common Heath. Emerson School's scarecrow 'Graham' and Springvale SDS scarecrow 'James' will be treasured and displayed in the vegetable garden maintained by gardeners and horticulturalist Susie.

Emerson students began their day with recess in the botanical gardens, before entering the Peace and Prosperity Garden and then going inside Government House -the largest house in Australia. The State Dining Room has one table made of Australian red cedar and Spanish mahogany that can seat 54 people. It is surrounded by portraits of the Royal Family. Government House Ballroom features the State Chair, used only by the Monarch or the Monarch's representative. The Ballroom has a blue ceiling painted with 700 books of gold leaf, and New Zealand Kauri pine floor boards. It is larger than the Ballroom at Buckingham Palace. Government House has a yellow flag atop, representing the prosperity of the gold mining times that funded the building of Melbourne -beginning with Government House and Saint Patricks Cathedral. Students finished their day by visiting the eternal flame and eating lunch at the Shrine of Remembrance. Government House Open Day is held on Australia Day and is free entry. This is when families can visit the house, enjoy activities, explore the historic stables and enjoy a garden picnic.
